Key Questions and Lesson focus

Goldilocks and the 3 Bears

Recall key facts from the story. Think about the setting, characters and plot. Write a recount of the story, using the key facts.



Little Red Riding Hood

Focus on the key characters in the story. What are their characteristics? Create character descriptions. Draw 'Wanted' posters to catch the wolf!



The Three Little Pigs

Re-tell the story through active story making. Over 3 weeks, - imitate, innovate and invent a new version of the story. Create story maps.

The Tortoise and the Hare

Use a story board to sequence the main events in the story. Re-create a racecourse add labels and elements within the setting.

The Emperor's New clothes

Enjoy a story with a funny Ending! The children will use the theme of clothes to investigate materials for a new rain coat!

The Gingerbread Man

Make gingerbread biscuits. Look at the main ingredients. What are the spices? What would happen to the biscuit if it fell into water?

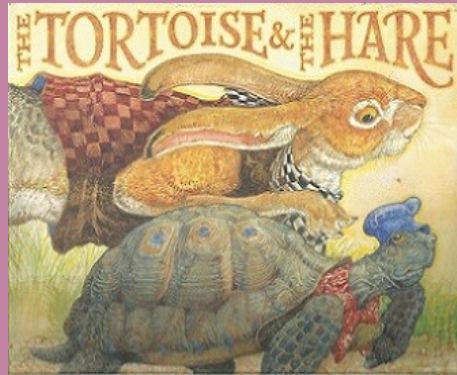

Vocabulary	Definition
Tales	A story that has been retold over many years. Sometimes called a fairy tale.
Setting	Where a story takes place, such as a forest.
Plot	It describes the events that make up a story. There is often a sequence of events.
Character	A person or animal in a story.
Fable	A short story that has a moral .
Hero	The main character in a story. A hero is usually a character who is good and well-liked.
Villain	The character who is the opposite of the hero. The villain could be mean, nasty or evil!
